The Green Waste site consists of three areas, see picture below and follow the instructions on the signs to keep our site functioning properly:

Branches ONLY (for chipping)

Grass Clippings and leaves ONLY

FREE MULCH ONLY

These CC&R's are necessary to preserve & enhance property values throughout our community and to protect and maintain the rural residential character of the area. A few examples are: having paint samples, fencing, building and any outdoor structures approved. We protect our oaks, you MUST get approval for the removal of any oak trees on your property.

A SURPRISING LETTER FROM THE BUILDER & HOMEOWNER

In 1978, a young couple sold their home in Half Moon Bay and moved to Bakersfield. Ken Cooper and his (late) wife Dolores had a vision of building a home in the mountains that was inspired by articles in the Mother Earth News magazine. By the following Spring, they had purchased a lot in Stallion Springs on Buckskin Drive for \$9,000 and modified their house plans purchased from a San Francisco solar home designer called Ekose'a. That Summer on weekends, they camped on the lot in a replica Sioux Indian

teepee during construction of their outbuilding barn.

Ken arranged with contractor Don Tull of Golden Hills to build the structural parts of the barn and house. By September, they moved their household and cat, Mandy, into the barn where they lived for six months during initial home construction.

Ken had to commute to his job in Bakersfield, but assisted in all the work and then finished the home himself over the next four years. The two-story home features a large solarium that controls a unique heating and cooling system of geothermal convection air movement within a double-shell structure. In 1984, Ken and his wife moved away, and he never expected to see the house again.

In 2017, a young couple, Kirsten and Michael Souders and son Carson, also had a vision to live in the mountains which took them to Stallion Springs. They bought the solar home and moved in with their cats. The following year they held their wedding in the front yard that overlooked

the San Joaquin Valley.

Ken didn't know the current owners, but December 2019, decided to write an extensive letter to the home's address about the property development, thinking they would like to know its unique history and the science of the

home. The letter was received with surprise and appreciation, and after numerous emails, a visit was arranged. In October, 2020, Ken and his wife Molly enjoyed a home and property tour with the Souders. When Ken left the home in 1984, he was thirty-six years old, and coincidentally it had been thirty-six years since he had seen the home. It was a nostalgic visit for Ken, and being back on site, he was able to give the Souders additional information about changes in the house and barn between the thirty-three-year gap of their ownerships, and offered some guidance on its solar home functions.

The Souders received a time-capsule gift to preserve special memories. They also got original copies of the actual <u>Mother Earth News</u> magazines that made it all possible. They have made improvements to the home, and for however long they live there, a new chapter will be written in its history.



Thank you Jim Lundy for volunteering and helping build the ballfield. Thank you to the POA for your donations for bleachers and benches.









WINTER IS HERE, PROTECT YOUR PIPES!

Frozen pipes can present an invisible threat – one that you might not recognize until the weather starts to warm. By then, the <u>water damage can be significant and costly</u>. Fortunately, keeping your home warmer, at a consistent temperature, and better insulated can help protect your pipes from freezing this winter.

Which Pipes Are Most at Risk?

Pipes that are most exposed to the elements, including those outdoors and along the exterior walls of your home, may need extra protection during winter months. These include the following:

- Outdoor hose hookups and faucets.
- Swimming pool supply lines.
- Lawn sprinkler lines.
- Water pipes in unheated, interior locations such as basements, crawl spaces, attics, garages and kitchen and bathroom cabinets.

Pipes running against exterior walls with little or no insulation.

How to Help Prevent Frozen Pipes

Before winter:

 Check your home for areas where water pipes are located in unheated or poorly insulated areas. Be sure to check your basement, attic, crawl space, garage and within cabinets containing plumbing. Hot and cold water pipes should both be insulated.

Products such as pipe sleeves or UL-listed heat tape or heat cable can help insulate or heat exposed water pipes.

During winter:

- Close inside valves supplying water to outdoor faucets and hookups.
- Open outdoor faucets to allow residual water to drain; be sure to

- keep them open during the cold weather months, while the water supply is turned off.
- Keep garage doors closed to help protect water pipes located in the garage.
- Open the doors on cabinets where plumbing is located. This can help allow warmer air to circulate around the pipes.
- For pipes that are at risk of freezing (both hot and cold water pipes), let water drip from faucets.

Keep the heat in your home set at a minimum of 55 degrees.

Why is a Frozen Pipe a Concern?

When water begins to freeze, it expands. This can cause both plastic and metal pipes to burst, possibly leading to significant water damage to your home.

- Since water expands when it freezes, it puts unwanted pressure on pipes.
- As water freezes, the force exerted from the expansion can cause a pipe to burst, regardless of the strength of the material.

You may not know you have a burst pipe as the water has turned to ice. Once the temperature starts to warm and thawing begins, leaking and flooding can occur.

What Do You Do if You Have a Frozen Pipe?

If you have a leak, turn the water off immediately to prevent water damage and call a licensed plumber to make repairs. If your home is heated by an older steam heating system, consult with your heating professional to determine if it is safe to continue to run the heating system with the water supply turned off for your particular heating system.



FOR THE NEXT PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFF?

Independent Living Center of Kern County (ILCKC) is partnering with PG&E, SCE, along with other community organizations to help people with disabilities be prepared by:

-Receiving ILCKC support in the event of a Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) or disaster.

-Signing up for the Medical Baseline Program to lower the rate on your monthly energy bill, if you require the use of a medical or life support device.

-Accessing backup portable batteries for those who require power for medical reasons. Individuals who use life-sustaining electrical support will be the highest priority.

-Providing tools to help you create a disaster plan, including a personalized disaster kit.

JUST A HEADS UP ABOUT WATER PAYMENTS....

When you use your bill payment system to pay Stallion Springs CSD, your bank writes a check and it is sent by mail.

Your bank may take money out of your account today, but not write a check for up to 10 days after your request.

We may not get your payment for up to 14 days after your request.

SSCSD offers credit card payments thru our website www.stallionspringscsd.com and we now offer Phone payments and Auto payments by calling: 661-825-1515.

There is a minimum processing charge for the online credit card payments, but the payments are processed immediately.



What you will find in your water bill....

<u>Description</u>: is where you will find what you are paying for or if you have a previous balance.

<u>Recharge fee</u>— is the amount you pay if you <u>have</u> <u>not</u> signed a covenant. This fee can be eliminated if you come into the office and have a form notarized.

Water—this is the water you used for two months.

Sewer—if you have sewer services.

Refuse—Trash

<u>Service Charge</u>— is the Base Rate that will be charged whether you use water or not.

PAY ONLINE! Pay your water bill anytime, anywhere. Online Bill Pay makes it easy for you to manage your water bill. You can view your bill, see payment history, etc. You can even do auto pay. Owners can register or use Quick Pay. Renter's Only use Quick Pay. Go to our website at www.stallionspringscsd.com. It is located on the Home Page.

Please be advised that the Main District Water Valve should never be turned at your meter. By doing this, it may cause damage or may be broken which will cause water shut offs not only to your residence, but to a whole neighborhood. Thank you.

Recommended: All customers should have their own customer valve for shutting off water.

INFORMATION AND NOTES

- For emergency police, fire and medical calls dial 911 and specify to the dispatcher that you live in Stallion Springs. To reach the police for nonemergency purposes, contact Kern County Dispatch at (800) or (661) 861-3110.
